BSLC Newsletter

“Music Notes” December, 2022.

Throughout the season of Advent, we enjoy the tradition of lighting the candles on an Advent Wreath. How did this tradition begin? Was it started by Martin Luther in 1517? Briefly: No, not by Luther, but it did start in Germany.

The Advent Wreath tradition was begun in 1839 by Johann Wichern, a Lutheran pastor. He wanted to help the children in his mission school countdown to Christmas, so he took an old cartwheel and on it mounted 24 small red candles for weekdays, separated by 4 larger white candles, one for each of the 4 Sundays before Christmas. This eventually led to a smaller wreath of greens, with only 4 candles, used in family settings during Advent. In the 1920's, German Catholics adopted the tradition, which spread to north America in the 1930's.

Our modern Advent wreath has evolved into a host of symbolisms. First it is in circular form, representing the eternity of our God-no beginning, no ending, God's infinite love and the promise of everlasting life in Christ.

The evergreens also have meaning:
Laurel: Victory over persecution and suffering

Pine, Holly & Yew: Immortality

Cedar: Strength and Healing

Pine Cones: Life and Resurrection

The candles represent a different gift of the Spirit each week:

- 1) Hope (purple or blue) The “Prophecy Candle”- Anticipation of Jesus’ birth and 2nd coming
- 2) Peace (purple or blue) The “Bethlehem Candle”-Mary & Joseph’s journey to Bethlehem
- 3) Joy (pink) The “Shepherd’s Candle”. Joy at Jesus’ Birth and our joy on “Gaudate” (Latin for “Rejoice Ye”), the first word of the Introit for the 3rd Sun. in Advent and the midpoint through the Advent season of fasting, repentance, prayer, good deeds, and special music.
- 4) Love (purple or blue) The “Angel’s Candle”-Message of the Angels: “Peace on Earth, Goodwill to All.”
- 5) Christmas (white) The “Christ Candle” -lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, signifies the Purity of our Savior.

(This order may be slightly different in other denominations.)

In the United Kingdom, most wreaths feature all red candles and in the Eastern Orthodox tradition, there are 6 candles:

- 1.Green (Faith) 2. Blue (Hope) 3.Gold (Love) 4. White (Peace)
- 5.Purple (Repentance) 6. Red (Communion).

Along with the wreath, came the practice of singing a special song as the candles of the wreath are lit. Most advent wreath candle-lighting songs or hymns have 4 stanzas, each appropriate to whatever candle “theme” is being featured that day, and usually a 5th stanza to be used on Christmas, when all of the candles are lit. This year we are featuring a song entitled: “Candles Glowing, Promise Showing” set to the tune of W ZLOBIE LEZY, which you will recognize as the tune of the lovely Polish Christmas carol: “Infant Holy, Infant Lowly.” These words were penned by the Rev. Elana Keppel Levy, who registered them under Creative Commons licensing, giving free rights to use the song as long as she is credited and it is not sold.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NOVEMBER 2022 COUNCIL AND VOTERS MEETINGS.

The regular Council meeting was held November 16th. The Voters meeting was held November 20th. Highlights of those meetings are:

- Pastor thanked everyone who made the Highland Heavy Athletics competition a success. Worship was held on the patio. Trustees served hamburgers, hot dogs, and sides.

- LCEF workshop with Rev. Billy Brath was held Nov. 3rd. More information about the 'Forward 23' program will be coming!
- Pastor, Wendell, and Charles attended the workshop at Christ Greenfield about attracting and retaining members. We need to consider ways to get contact information from visitors attending our events.
- Fund Balances as of Sep 30: LCEF Savings \$71,429.47; Wells Fargo Savings (Matching Funds) \$27,163.03; Wells Fargo Checking \$34,392.05.
- October ended with a positive balance of \$3,630.89.
- Year-to-Date balance at the end of October was a negative \$683.05
- LCEF loan for replacement of air conditioners was approved. Check has been received and deposited.
- Lucy Durham memorial fund will be available on EasyTithe until January 1st.
- President Cyndi, the Board of Finance, and Board members met to work on several budget scenarios. Cyndi has also met with circuit visitor Pastor Frank to discuss reviewing the agreement with Mt.View about sharing Pastor Tim's time. In 2023, BSLC's financial responsibility increases to 75% for the final year of the agreement. The Board of Finance thinks MVLC has not honored the agreement arranged by Pastor Frank to reduce Pastor Tim's workload at MVLC. This would be an excellent time to review the terms of the agreement with Pastor Frank and MVLC and BSLC leadership.
- Cyndi has met with Pastor Frank recently and learned the following information:
 - In 8 years, the LCMS will be down by 3000 pastors.
 - This year graduated 55 new pastors; 350 are expected to retire.
- **Motion made by Jim Timm for Council to appoint Wendell Robson to chair a Call committee and to assemble the members of that Committee. Second by Skip McFadden. Motion passed.**
- **Motion made, seconded, carried to accept 2023 deficit Budget proposal with full-time pastor, salary increases, and minor changes suggested by BSLC's boards.**
- Stewardship reported they are keeping in touch with the schools.
- Time, talent, and treasure pledges will be collected November 20th. Stewardship will serve a brunch after the worship service that day.
- Trustees reported 78 volunteer hours were logged by members.
- New sidewalk to choir room from south narthex door has been completed.
- The GLORIA team met Monday, Nov. 20th to plan music through the end of December and the first two weeks of January.
- The Blake Flattley concert Dec. 9th at 7 PM will be on the patio.
- Annie Anderson will lead a Paint and Sip event Dec. 17th.
- Sight and Sound Theater will be releasing a film about the man who wrote 'I heard the bells'. There will be an opportunity to see this movie Dec. 4th.
- Schinkes are organizing a blessing of the animals event in January.
- President Cyndi reviewed the LCEF Ministry Coaching Program presented by Rev. Billy Brath Nov. 3rd. Nine BSLC members were present.
 - LCEF identified 4 areas to be addressed:
 - Guiding Statement - Our Mission statement, "Serving the Lord, extending the gospel, and making Jesus alive in the community"
 - BSLC's current ministries
 - BSLC's People and Place
 - Money and being Faithful Stewards
 - Described a four-phase approach over the next two years illustrated by a timeline beginning November 2022 and extending through January 2024
 - Leader Planning, congregation budget approval, winter campaign prep from now to February 2023

- Stewardship campaign - February 2023
- Living and planning - February 2023 to January 2024
- Ministry Expansion-beginning January 2024
- Rev. Brath will meet with BSLC in July to review progress.
- Other suggestions included a every member visit, preparation of a booklet including mission statement, time and talent opportunities, budget including 5% tithe to District and 5% tithe to BSLC ministries, creating a calendar
- Voters approved the amended Beautiful Savior Constitution and Bylaws at the Nov. 20th meeting.
- Voters also approved moving the Budget meeting to December 4th, following the worship service.

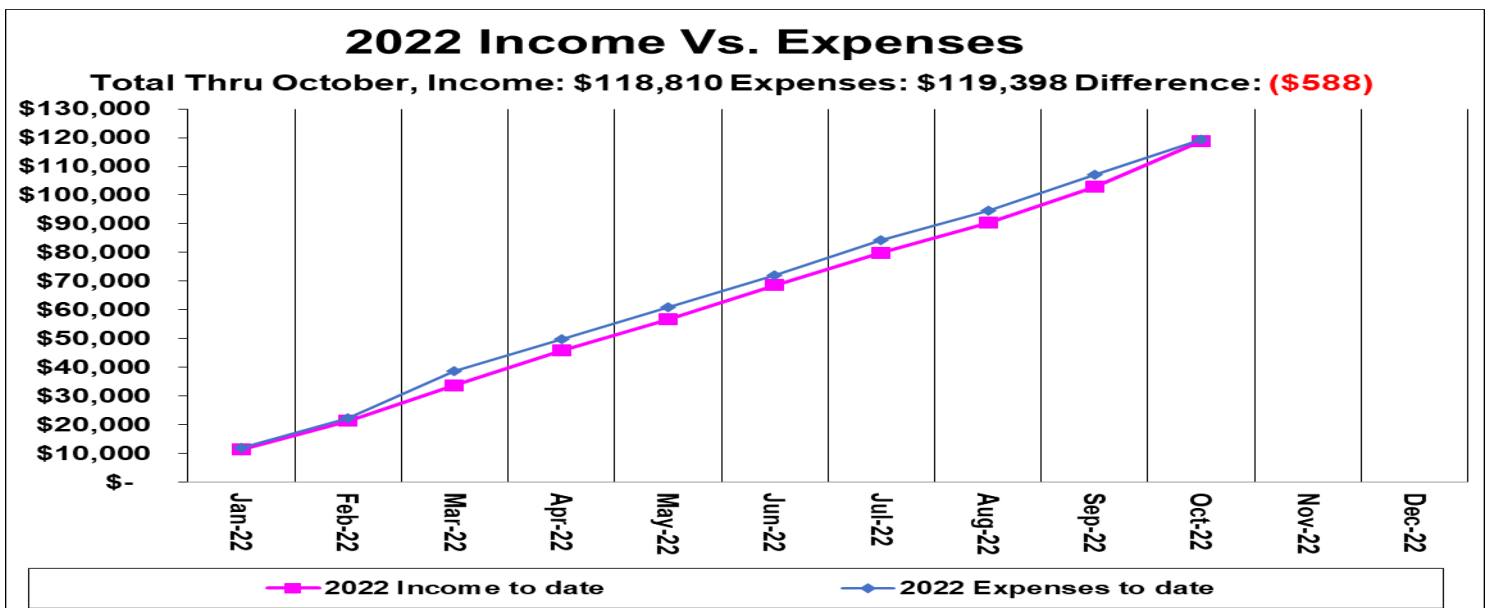
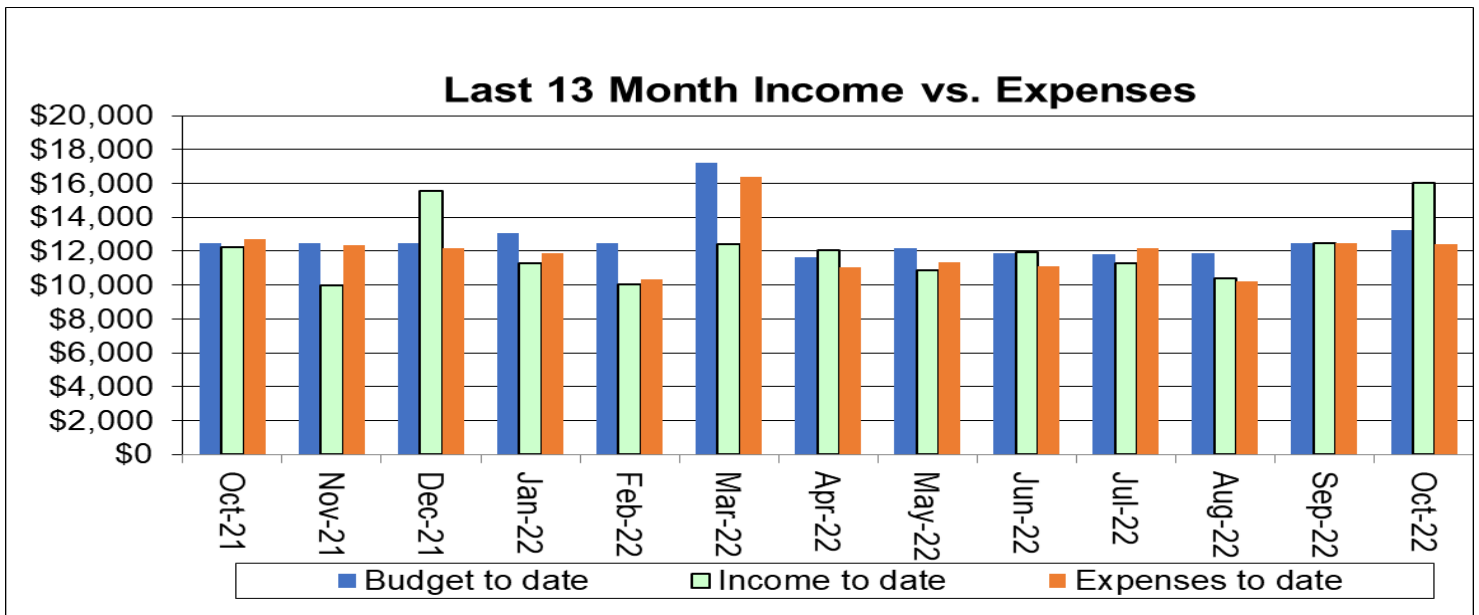
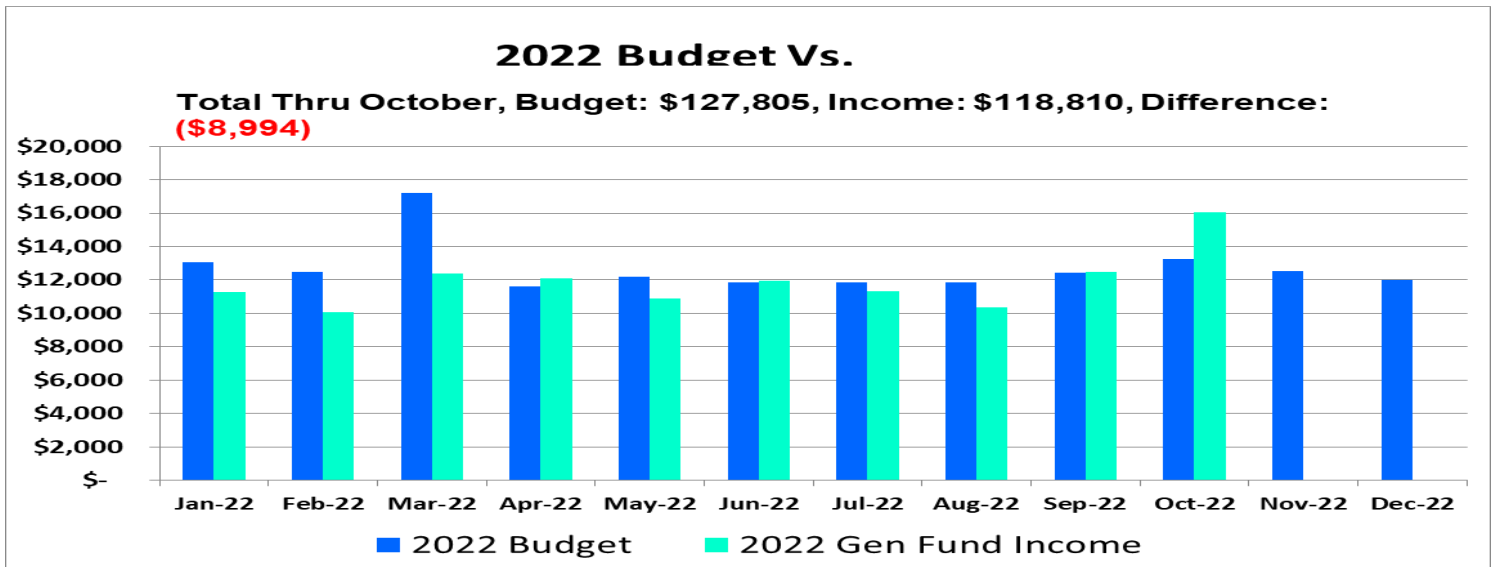

Pastor Tim Anderson:

Do you see, do you hear, do you know, and do you proclaim?

Said the night wind to the little lamb:

"Do you see what I see?

Way up in the sky, little lamb

Do you see what I see?

A star, a star, dancing in the night

With a tail as big as a kite

With a tail as big as a kite"

As I was driving into church on the morning that I wrote this article for you, I turned on the car radio and finally, after thanksgiving, turned my radio to Christmas music. The song that came out of the car was the iconic "Do you Hear What I Hear" with lyrics by Noël Regney and music by Gloria Shayne. This couple wrote the classic in 1962 although it really went mainstream the next year when Bing Crosby recorded it and released it in 1963.

But the inspiration of the song may come as a surprise, it was written during the Cuban missile crisis during a time in our nation's history where it was common place for Schools to encourage children to hide under desks in school in case the worst-case scenario happened and a missile was fired at us here in the United States. In interviews both Shayne and Regney have stated that the lyrics "Said the night wind to the little lamb, 'Do you see what I see?'" and "Pray for peace, people everywhere" came to them after watching babies being pushed in strollers on the sidewalks of New York City. Shayne even stated in an interview years later that "neither of us could personally perform the entire song at the time we wrote it because of the emotions surrounding the Cuban Missile Crisis: 'Our little song broke us up. You must realize there was a threat of war at the time.'

Sixty years later, and there is still the threat of war, all the time. In a way that has never ceased or changed. Sixty years later and this little song which dances around the birth of Jesus without ever actually naming him, is still an invitation to ask the questions, do you see? Do you hear? Do you know? Do you proclaim? Ok, I'll admit that last one is a Pastor Tim addition, but still, what do we see, know, and speak of as Christian people this time of year?

Because what we see in the world around us is sadly not much different than the world of 1962. To think this song was released shortly after the birth of our congregation, and the world our church still serves, is not much different from the world we served when we first started to reach as Pastor Feurbringer once said "the immediate situation around us." There is still war and fear of war, heck there is even still some fear of missiles being fired at us, even if the

classroom drills have stopped. There is still heartache, still famine, still illness and disease, still division, maybe even more division, in a culture that seeks to divide more than unify. What we see in this world is broken, and that brokenness breaks us. It makes us weep like Jesus, for our cities, for our families, for our communities, for our world. It makes us realize that we really do live on a cold, dark winter night.

But that's not all we see, hear, know and proclaim this time of year. At least I pray that it is not all we see, hear, know and proclaim. Because in the midst of a world that 60 years later probably doesn't look too different, that still looks broken, that still looks like it's hurting, we see something else.

We see neighbors and friends and family members wrap homes in lights. We hear music on our radio that proclaims another message this time of year, even if they do so imperfectly, we know what's coming, and we proclaim, oh how we proclaim, and how I pray you proclaim what we find at the end of our advent Journey... Christ. Christ Jesus. The Babe of Bethlehem. Immanuel. God with us, God with you and God with me.

What if what we see we see in the words of Scripture, is that the time came for Mary to give birth and "she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." (Luke 2:7). What if we see the Christ born for us, God's presence and God's very word in human flesh, born to change the story forever, born to bring a peace the world cannot know because in reality, Jesus, not David, not Herod, not Caesar, not Charles, not Joe, not Kamala, not Donald, not Mike, not Barrack, not George, not Keri, not Katie, or any other human "king" or "Queen" is the mighty king. No one other than Christ can bring peace or bring us goodness and light. Only Jesus, only the one we see, hear, know and proclaim.

What if in his word again, we hear the announcement of the Angels to the Shepherds, that "'Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger.'" And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!" (Luke 2:10-14). What if we gather again and again, what if we each make a commitment to dive into his word this holiday season, what if we say in December that we will read a chapter of Luke every day as we approach Christmas Eve. We would get through the Gospel in 24 days and be reminded as we hear again why this Christ Child is here.

What if we know him and proclaim him to a world that only knows darkness, only knows

hate, only knows division, only knows conflict and pain, that this Jesus is the one born to put to death all that divides us from one another and most of all everything that divides us from him and from our Triune God. What if we proclaim what we know, that He is born to set us free. To all who wait, to all who hunger, Jesus is the end of our Advent and He is the very bread of life!

And what if, what if we proclaim him to a weary world that is again waiting to rejoice. What if we are bold this Christmas to proclaim Him to friends, to neighbors and to family so that more may know the one who truly brings peace and comfort and joy and hope. Read, mark, Learn and inwardly digest this newsletter and especially our December calendar. There is something literally every week this month to invite friends and family and neighbors to come to. You might think we're overdoing it, but that's the point. We want to create those opportunities for you to invite and proclaim He who brings us goodness and light, who promises us hope and a future unlike anything this world has to offer, in 1962, in 2022, or in 2082. He will be and will always remain our hope, our peace, our joy, and the love of God made flesh to love you with a love, a perfect love, that will not end. See Him, Hear Him, Know Him and most of all Proclaim Him, at Christmas and throughout every year.

Merry Christmas Beautiful Savior, He is and we are Beautiful Indeed. After all we know, that "Beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings good news, who publishes peace, who brings good news of happiness, who publishes salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns."
